A Message and Sincere Appreciation to the Family of Joan Van Camp

Dear Friends,

When the Mission Committee of First Presbyterian Church of Moorestown was told that a portion of the bequest honoring Joan Van Camp would be used for missions, we were overwhelmed. We could only imagine what good such a bequest would do in the ministries in which we work throughout our community and the world. What an incredible tribute to the memory of Joan Van Camp!

We began reaching out and talking to the ministries to see what long-range plans they have and how best to utilize these funds. Our initial thoughts were to select one or two ministries and assist them in expanding their work through capital projects such as building churches, schools or hospitals. This blessing was truly incredible.

In February, our director of Missions, Linda Jagiela, went to Uganda and Kenya to see firsthand what the needs were in this area. She previously had spent 2019 traveling with teams to Haiti, Mexico City, and Katerini, Greece. Two weeks after Linda arrived back to the United States from Africa, the COVID-19 crisis hit.

The appeals for humanitarian relief for assistance and specifically food began pouring in. In many of the developing countries where our missionaries are based, quarantine cut off all access to food. Fear of being beaten if they ventured out of their homes left many in dire straits. Hospitals were not equipped to handle a pandemic. Communal living did not allow for true quarantine. And lack of technology left schools unable to teach students. Access to water was limited and did not allow for the rigorous hand washing needed to curb the spread of germs.

In an emergency meeting of the Mission Committee, the team voted to change our focus and use the Van Camp bequest to save lives. Although this had not been our original plan, we believed that the Lord worked to allow us to do this incredible work by giving us the funds through this bequest. Our missionaries have sent photos and notes thanking us (really the Van Camp family) for what they were able to achieve as a result of these donations.



February 2020 remains quite vivid for us as a ministry for hosting two great women (Linda Jagiela, FPC) Moorestown and Sandy Newhall, UPI) on our small campus. We can't express enough in words that the visit was a blessing to carry us over the COVID-19 season that nobody had predicted. No sooner had our visitors left than we had some restrictions and cancellations of international flights. Thank God we had received our blessing and it never ended there. We have always received encouraging words in messages thousand miles from them. We are certain that it would not have happened without a team, a family, a congregation, and a community at First Pres Moorestown, NJ. You have brightened many days for us and helped us beat hunger and fear that has struck many families that we support here in Embu, Kenya.

Youth Promise Kenya has continued to be a safe haven for many youth who would have otherwise been exposed to drug abuse, prostitution, and other forms of evil. For almost three years now, love from friends like you has allowed us to continue offering digital literacy and mentoring to our teenagers. We had the privilege of visiting a number of families who were hit hard by COVID-19. One grandma





offered to vote in our executive director to be the governor of the county since she has seen no government come in to help her in such a way since COVID-19 struck. It sounded like a good joke but within her it was much more than that; though she was under influence of some local brew she was eager that the support would be needed more and more for such needy communities. We are stepping in to help where we can to make our community better than we found it. We thank Linda for stepping out of her comfort zone and flying many hours to be with us and for sure we got great moments with her. She danced with our youth, taught them photography, mentored our staff and directors, shared jokes and stories, prayed with us, ate with us, played with us, witnessed invasion by locusts with us, challenged us to publish our first newsletter that is running now, and she was not done with us yet. She told you about us and that's how you have poured more love into our basket.

Because of this, we are going out now to offer more love to our beneficiaries and more hands to fight the disease. Your kind gift of \$5,000 will support Youth Promise beneficiaries during this time of crisis. We were not sure how it was going to be for the next few months. You have resuscitated our hope. We feel loved as per the scripture in Matthew 22:37. Jesus said to him, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." And Yes! We shall love more the people we are serving.

Uganda

In the midst of poverty and income inequality, children in Uganda suffer greatly, especially in educational attainment, moral development, and spiritual growth. Their vulnerability is compounded by political instability and other social concerns, therefore making children and youth the most vulnerable groups of the population.

Despite the government's intervention to enable all people to access education through Universal Primary and Secondary Education, many schools in rural and urban areas are grappling with the diminished quality of education as a result of an ever-increasing enrollment. In schools, especially primary, the student to teacher ratio is estimated at 70:1. The government's official maximum ratio is 40:1. Only 2% of females finish high school. More than 50% of the country is under the age of 15.

Yamba Uganda

\$5,000



Yamba's first response towards COVID-19 was making water at our office premises accessible to beneficiary households. While most of our programs are shut down, we continue to provide critical services to our beneficiaries. We have stayed in touch with caregivers of children to find out how children are maneuvering this situation. Today, water has become a precious resource with high demand yet is very expensive to afford. Thank you for giving us water! Water is Life! (Note: FPC Moorestown provided funding to dig the well at YAMBA.)

Our second COVID-19 response was to intervene in providing food relief to Orphans and Other Children (OVC) households affected by the storm and the apparent COVID-19 pandemic. On 8th March, 2020, the Government of Uganda declared CoronaVirus (COVID-19) pandemic an emergency and a new disease which had no medicine or vaccine.



The president of Uganda put directives in the country as measures to prevent COVID-19 spread. Directives such a s self-quarantine and curfew laws have affected people's businesses and work that earned them a living causing acute famine and low household-income. On 3rd of April 2020, the Community of Bwambara Sub-county where Yamba ChildCare is located was hard hit by the aggressive storm which devastated crops and structures like homes and schools. As if COVID-19 was not enough, this has doubled the effect of acute shortage of food in the community, especially in our beneficiary households where we were hit with a tremendous hail storm that wiped out many of the crops that were not already eaten by the locust.

We have been able to support 106 families/households of orphans and other vulnerable children who have been affected by the storm destruction coupled with COVID-19. We have provided food relief support of 10kgs posho/corn flour and 5kgs of beans to assist in this hard time. Thank you for your support which has allowed us to help so many in our village and in the community around us. May God bless our friends and church family in Moorestown.

Some of the most pressing challenges that Malawi faces are poverty, poor education, a 10.6% HIV/AiIDS rate, and a massive rate of unemployment. Ninety percent of the population lives on less than \$2 a day.

Embangweni Hospital Malawi – Medical Benevolence Foundation

Embangweni Hospital serves a population of 100,000 people from more than 250 villages in a 35-mile radius in Northern Malawi. Malawi, with a population of 10 million people, is one of the world's poorest countries. Traveling to Embangweni can be difficult, especially during the rainy months from November to April. Most of Embangweni's patients are subsistence farmers, living in small villages with extended, very poor families. During the pandemic, MBF secured a 40-foot ocean container of pharmaceutical products including antibiotics and antifungals valued at more than \$70,000 to use in Malawi. Additionally, we air-freighted material for masks and purchased hepafabric

to be used in the construction of the masks. This will be made into more than 2,500 masks. We would not have been able to equip our hospital without the support of donors such as FPC Moorestown. Your long-time support and prayers are very much appreciated by our staff and those we serve in Malawi.



Rise Malawi \$5,000



Dear Friends at FPC Moorestown,

I'm so encouraged by your support for our work and your ongoing consideration for the needs of children and youth in Malawi. It will come as no surprise that COVID-19 has affected how we do our work. We know that it has had an impact on all of you and pray that you are staying safe and well. I wanted to let you know what things look like for us right now.

From the beginning, we knew how vulnerable our children and their families would be to this pandemic. In the village setting where many homes are close together, where daily livelihood depends on community, and where

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many families live off of the wages made on any given day, physical distancing is difficult, if not impossible. Being on lockdown without food is a life-threatening situation for many of our children, which may sound dramatic, but it is our reality. The children and youth who are already at risk are even more vulnerable during this COVID-19 pandemic.

There is one set of brothers on my mind often, Innocent, 18 years, and his younger brother Madalitso, 16 years. Their father passed away 10 years ago. Their mother was frequently ill and without a means of income. She moved back to her home village two years ago, some 160 miles from our campus. Both brothers are now in 11th grade. The high school sponsorship support from Rise Malawi helps them to stay at our boarding school. They are managing under this lockdown in a rented home, taking care of each other ... thanks to the food and housing support RiseMalawi is providing for them.

In efforts to do our best to protect our children, we made the decision in mid-March to close our schools and programs. The government officially declared 21 days of lockdown starting April 25th, but our commitment to the communities we serve is not on lockdown. Instead, our dedication has grown and shifted. We have adopted the role of civic educators to our community and beyond. And we are providing necessary goods to children and families in according to the measure God has entrusted us.

We are committed to serving our beneficiaries and reaching further into the village during this COVID-19 crisis, but we cannot do this alone.

God is in control \dots we are passing the same message to our sorrowful community.

What we are doing:

- We are continuing to house and care for five girls on our campus
- Training youth on the protective measures
- Training kids from the community to sew their reusable face masks
- Training our support staff and their families on COVID-19 protective measures
- Donated 60 homemade face masks, hand washing soap, and washing utensils at our local hospital
- Exploring e-Learning for our high school students. Using WhatsApp, we can be sending out lessons every day and to be accessed on their phones. However most families have no smartphones.
- Donating 300 notebooks and laundry soap to elementary children to continue doing school from home during this period
- We are planning to supply food to the poor of the poorest families around Madisi area.

Haiti

Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere, and it is also the third-largest country in the Caribbean.

Unfair labor practices are prevalent in the country, and the majority of people are jobless. Poor road conditions have had disastrous effects on farmers who face serious problems in taking their goods to markets and towns. In Haiti, only 60.7% of its population can read and write. Sanitation and water supply are two major challenges for Haitians. Pollution from human and other waste is prevalent in most of the Haitian rivers. Diseases including typhoid and hookworm are common in the region. One in 50 people in Haiti is affected with HIV/AIDS. Haitian children are prone to deaths, as more than 10% of them die before reaching the age of five. Half of its children are unvaccinated. Only 40% of its population has access to basic health care. It is also the most densely populated country in the Western Hemisphere, with 747 people per square mile. The average per capita income in Haiti is very low. It is \$480 a year with 80% of nationals living below the poverty line.

The Medical Benevolence Foundation Haiti Hospital in St. Croix

Hôpital Sainte Croix (HSC) is located in Léogâne, 20 miles west of Port-au-Prince. Started as a small outpatient clinic in 1968, the hospital grew to be the regional medical center serving the peninsula of Haiti.



Dear Mission Committee of FPC Moorestown,

Thank you so much for your generousity on behalf of the medical professionals, patients and families at Hospital St. Croix. This has been a particularly difficult year in Haiti. Your faithfulness and love are a great blessing to those who need it most.

Amid the political tension and the havoc, protestors are adding to the rising numbers of COVID cases in Haiti. Hôpital Ste. Croix is proactively taking preventative measures against the virus. Having formed a COVID Committee, they established essential protocols that will be used across the board with COVID patients. This includes everything from reporting and notation, to designating specific rooms for outpatients who show signs of the virus. The committee also determined it would be difficult to test any infected staff member before they returned to work due to a lack of test kits in the country and thus limited testing availability. Instead they have set the standard that any staff would need to be free of all COVID symptoms for 14 days before returning to work. There is still much to do but the committee is making notable progress.

We shipped a container of pharmaceuticals and supplies in an ocean container. These included antibotics, anti-inflammatory medication and asthma medication valued at \$675,000. Additionally, we were able to purchase 150 boxes of gloves, 200 boxes of gauze, and 118 sterile hospital gowns. This was delivered at the end of April.

We are truly blessed to have you as a partner and thank you for donation to assist in these efforts. FPC Moorestown is truly a blessing to those we serve in Haiti.

I spoke with our director of UrbanPromise Honduras, Londin Velasquez, and with tears in his eyes he updated me on the situation in Copán Ruinas. While the direct COVID-19 health impact in Copán has been almost non-existent, the economic and emotional toll of a strict four-month quarantine is devastating.

Our staff estimates that around 80 percent of families we serve have lost their jobs. They cover expenses on a month-to-month basis, which means they depend on their current salary to cover immediate expenses. Families have been without work now for four months and projections are not improving.

Our staff carries food distributions to houses, and families welcome the gift with open arms. The excitement and energy from the first deliveries has evolved

into a tender exchange of gratitude as a certain heaviness hangs in the air. Our staff has stepped into a role that at times feels more pastoral as they not only minister to children but now also connect with parents stressed and scared about the unknown.

We just did another distribution this week and made the local news. Food, school supplies and ... baby chickens. A little something extra to teach responsibility with the kids and eventually provide eggs for the family. Our staff is 5 star!! Such a privilege to serve with them. Our team continues to roll out a creative package of support that has included everything from food distribution, to virtual camps, TV programs, and entrepreneurial seed capital.

Your donation has gone a long way to make these relief efforts possible and we are blessed to have you as a partner.

It's crazy to think about how all our programs have pivoted to respond to COVID in the last few months, but the impact has been more than we expected. Please keep us in your prayers – Mexico is now #3 in the world in deaths related to COVID so the situation is still very dire, but we're not without hope.

- Transforming fragile cities into communities of SHALOM is a holistic process. During the crisis caused by COVID-19, seeking SHALOM includes food security projects like home vegetable gardens and rabbits.
- As a part of our Food Security project, the team is training families on how to raise and breed rabbits. The Food Security project will last at least six months, providing time and space for neighbors to get to know each other, strengthening social cohesion building trust and SHALOM while also helping provide food security.
- So far we have installed 101 hand-washing stations in the communities where we work. While these stations meet the very tangible need of providing access to hand-washing water, their impact extends far beyond that. Many of the hand-washing stations have become urban reference points; for example: "Turn left at the butcher shop and meet me by the field." And now the hand-washing stations have been incorporated, too; for example: "Go up the hill and turn right on the street where you see the hand-washing station on the corner."

Knowing how to explain where things are is an important part of strengthening the social fabric of a community, and we are excited to see the hand-washing stations strengthening civil society in more ways than one.

Society for Nutrition, Education & Health Action (SNEHA)

\$5,000



We are now in the eye of the pandemic. As a country, India has not seen this kind of trauma since the painful cross-migration during partition in 1947. We see families being thrown out by landlords because they cannot pay rent, employers firing their workers, and domestic workers being treated as untouchables by the same people who previously depended on them for housework and childcare. Teachers in private schools have lost their jobs and contract teachers in government schools are afraid of being thrown out. Many have not been paid for several months.

Children of all social groups and classes are bombarded with messages about the danger of the Coronavirus and how they should remain indoors even as they witnessed thousands of families walking home in the hot summer sun, crowded trains and buses, and the most heart wrenching of all – Hunger and Hopelessness. Children are traumatized and confused and not able to

understand what is happening around them. Online teaching without apps like Zoom, Google-Meet, etc. are a massive challenge for teachers who can only resort to teaching through whatsapp.

Never before has this community been so severely affected as it has been during this pandemic. Despite government orders to not remove people from jobs, most of the domestic maids have been removed from their jobs and have little help from the men in the family. It's almost as if life has come to a standstill for them. They now look to survive another day. During the course of the month, Society for Nutrition, Education & Health Action (SNEHA) continued to provide food and handmade masks to families in the community. Our online education for students from Lower Kindergarten to 12th Grade continued successfully through the month.

Despite the evident challenges, more than 75% of students were able to take part in the online classes. It has once again been a difficult monsoon season at SNEHA. Two years ago we had a calamity in the premises which was so disheartening and discouraging. It was through your constant prayers, emails and support that we got through that difficult period and were able to rebuild and reconstruct the boundary wall, making it stronger, higher and sturdier than ever. It protected SNEHA from overflowing canal running adjacent to the school. Unfortunately, in mid-August, the overflowing water in the canal broke through a wall supporting the gates leading into SNEHA and caused some damage again.

A difficult 2020 only got harder but maybe there's a lesson in this for us and we need to rebuild the other walls similar in structure and depth as the one we built two years ago. We also know that the damage could have been far worse but the Lord has definitely protected us from a greater calamity. We are hoping that we will have adequate resources post the monsoon season to reconstruct our walls. Even if the walls around us crumble, we must remain steadfast in faith. We thank you for your support as it has made all of these things possible.

We ask that you pray for us and India during these challenging times as we do for you. We thank you so much for your support during this period of uncertainty. You support has allowed us to continue operating, educating our children, and feeding the people.

India now has the third highest number of COVID cases in the world with more than 769,000 confirmed cases, although the number of active cases is 271,348. Deaths in India attributed to COVID number 21,144.

Some states in India are affected worse than others. Our partner is headquartered in Chennai, Tamil Nadu. Chennai has repeatedly reported more than 2,000 cases a day and Tamil Nadu will be restricting mobility through the end of October. Through local ministry partners, our partner has been providing aid to impoverished families in villages in Tamil Nadu and Andhra Pradesh where literacy classes have previously been held. COVID Relief Kits including rice, cooking oil, dahl, and sanitation supplies provide three weeks of food for a family



of four. You have helped share the love of God in a practical way by providing kits to many families. Your support was really needed in order to keep our staff employed and abating hunger in our communities.

Dear Mission Committee of First Presbyterian Church of Moorestown,

Thank you for your generous support of the Christian Caring Center. We so appreciate your helping us get a new roof and giving us funds for our COVID-19 relief efforts. We have been operating our food pantry in our parking lot two days a week. We have been receiving food from the SJ Food Bank as well as purchasing supplemental food. Each Client is now receiving a full week's worth of food. Our staff continues to work but our volunteer staff has not been able to work. We are seeing four times as many people than we did prior to the pandemic. The heat of this summer has left the homeless extemely vulnerable. Day shelters, libraries, and lunch programs are all closed to the homeless who regularly use these places of refuge to find relief from the weather.



We continue to bring lunches to the woods and to the hotels three days a week. Our requests for housing assistance are five times as high as they previously were. We continue to support our clients with case management without stopping. We have re-equipped our offices utilizing the COVID-19 guidelines in order to create a safe environment for our clients and staff.

We know that God is working in us each and every day. With your support, we have been able to carry on our program and share the love of Jesus Christ to the most vulnerable people in our community.


