Hope to the Hopeless Community

Hebrews 11:1 Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

Our motto is **Raising a Generation of Hope**. RiseMalawi serves children who are living in poverty and communities that have lost hope. We serve the marginalized children who have lost hope about their future. Our programs aim at helping the children see a new life, a hopeful life of the future.

One such story of faith and hope is Veronica Mateyu. At 19, she is in 9th Grade. She joined Rise Malawi in 2016 as a camp kid in 5th Grade. She stayed out of school for three years because of her father's religious faith that does not allow girls to shave their hair or attend any form of school. Veronica didn't like being a school dropout. She hated seeing her friends going to school while she stayed home. She kept the faith for her father's sake but disliked the treatment that she was receiving because of her father's religion. Whenever she asked her father to go to school and for school supplies, her dad's response would be "stay home and take care of your sisters, girls are not supposed to be educated".

Veronica's relationship with RiseMalawi leaders helped her rethink school, reclaim her dream. RiseMalawi reasoned with her parents and offered to support the girls with their education. Luckily, her father accepted our offer. She enrolled in 5th grade at a local school when she was 16 years. She joined our After School Program for extra tutoring, counseling, bible lessons and meals.

She worked in tobacco farms to buy her first school uniform when she reenrolled back in school. Later, RiseMalawi through Veronica's sponsor, bought her another set of uniform and exercise books, pens, pencils and a school bag. She became unstoppable!

For four years, RiseMalawi provided her with school resources and food through the Feeding Program. For four years in elementary school, Veronica always got A's and B's in her tests. Last year, she managed to sit for national examinations at 8th Grade. This examination is used by the government to select who will attend public high schools. Out of 225,000 pupils who passed the examination in 2020, only 85,000 pupils were selected to start 9th grade at various government high schools leaving out 140,000 eligible pupils without a chance of high school unless they go to private high school which are very expensive for ordinary Malawian.

Against all odds, Veronica is now a freshman in high school. Veronica is given a spot at Madisi Secondary School. Through determinations and support from people like you, Veronica is on her road to becoming a nurse.

Prayer: Pray for the children we serve in Malawi. Specifically, pray for loving homes, provision of food, good housing, educational supplies and psychosocial support.

One of these amazing girls was Stiveria.

I met Stiveria on December of 2016 at her home. I remember it took us 2 hours on the bus to get where she stayed. It was a rainy day, and Thoko and I met her together with her grandparents. Her grandfather shared with us that "they could not provide her with all of her basic needs". He also told us that Stiveria was forced to drop out of high school because he could not afford the fees. With faith, Thoko and I and other friends committed to supporting her education although we did not have money readily available at that point. God though did provide and today, Stiveria is enrolled in the university, pursuing her Bachelor of Commerce Degree in Internal Audit.

To say that we are super happy for her is an understatement; the truth is, we are amazed at how God works in writing better stories in the lives of others using ordinary people like you and me. There have been times when my team could not afford to pay for her fees, we were frustrated and hopeless, but God brought in game-changers from different parts of the world to give her a hand when she needed it most. To that, I am very thankful. —Ishmael Adam

TRUSTING GOD'S FAITHFULLNESS

Psalms 121:1-2 " I will lift up to the hills, where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth.

Seeds of Promise is a Christian nonprofit organization whose main aim is to fight extreme poverty through sustainable farming, promoting better nutritional choices and entrepreneurship training for the youth in Malawi. Seeds of Promise is based in Lilongwe with a 50 acre farm and a city office where our entrepreneurial training happens. God called me into youth discipleship and mentorship in the year 2008, especially to High School graduates living in a cycle of poverty and who do not have an opportunity to go to college. At the time God was calling me into ministry, I was earning under a dollar per day. I questioned how God would sustain my life and ministry that he was calling me to do. I heard God whispering to me, saying "You do not look for a capital to start ministry but you only need Me for my kingdom business." My question of sustainability was answered through that and it was clear that I did not need to worry about provision but to fix my eyes on God for his provision.

A Test of a Trust in God's Faithfulness

In 2016, I was trained as a leader by Urban Promise in Camden, New Jersey and sent home to launch a youth ministry which mentors thirty youth missional entrepreneurs every year. While we were experiencing ministry growth and cerebrating the fruits of our program over the past five years, Covid 19 hit the world in 2020. Our partners in Ministry were affected by Covid 19 economically. Many people lost their jobs and had to live on what little savings they had. The youth in our program were also affected by Covid 19. Due to Covid 19, our funding decreased and we were not able to run programs and receive salaries. My wife was pregnant and we had used all our savings for medical bills. We quickly realized that public hospitals were no longer a safe place for my wife to give birth because of overcrowding.



My wife said "I wish we could have gone to a good private hospital." However, we could not afford a private hospital. My wife encouraged me to apply for another job so that we can have a better pay and a more secure job. My trust in God's faithfulness and provision was tested at night and I questioned God's provision and his availability in my prayers.

God showed up in this season! My wife gave birth to our beautiful first-born daughter and called her Ramira Hadassah Ghambi. Indeed, we have seen God's faithfulness. It is in this season where our young missional entrepreneurs being mentored have been able to serve our communities by making masks for the all Malawi project and being able to make some money for self sustainability. It is in this season just at the right time our missional partners supported us through Urban Promise with funds to help us pay our staff. It is in this season through prayers that my wife has openly told me that she will continue serving God with me and will follow me wherever God is sending me to go. We are now mentoring young people together at Seeds of Promise.

Reflection: What area in your life in this season is putting your trust in God's faithfulness to test? When you feel like giving up, Trust God, He who started the good work will put it to completion.

Pray: Heavenly father, please assist Seeds of Promise to become self sustaining. Help them prepare for the 500 students who will be joining them for summer camp in July. Encourage Luwani and the others in this ministry to continue to find strength and hope in you. Bless his family and his beautiful new daughter. Amen



Just On Time!

God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble" Psalm 46:1.

The Corona pandemic crisis left many families all over the world struggling for food, jobs, etc. Uganda went through a total lockdown in the first few months. For families like Michael's it hard and was very rough. The lack of enough food over many months gave Michael who is nine years old and his single mother stomach ulcers.

One evening close to dinner time, one of Children Alive Ministries' staff members visited Michael. They found him and his two younger brothers each eating a small piece of posho (maize flour bread) and cooked green vegetables. Our staff was visiting to bring them food and a few more necessities.

While their mother was receiving the gifts from us, the boys had started eating off of her plate of food. We learned that this was the last bit of food they had in the house to eat. The posho was about a quarter a kilogram and not very much to sustain them.



Four years ago, we started our ministry in the small town of Embu. Our goal was to provide computer mentoring and literacy to teens. This would allow them to obtain jobs or to have the opportunity to enter universities. We soon found that our goal was great, but the need was greater.

In the four years that we have been here, we have seen our students not only learning to use a computer but now having access to information for them to grow in their knowledge. They are now linked to their colleges and can take the courses that they only once dreamed. We ask them what they want to do in life, and we pray with them that they will achieve those dreams.

Pius graduated high school last year. His sister gave him a flyer we had left at her school regarding our continuing education program. He entered our program with a desire to learn. Not only did he learn, he applied his knowledge by getting accepted and recently joining Nairobi University where he is studying for a bachelor's degree in law.

We see many students like Pius who are very bright but are lost. Youth Promise gives them a hand to find their way. We pray, teach, and support them materially where we can. God is good all the time.



Step out in Faith: It pleases God!

Sparks of Hope

Together as the Body of Christ, may we continue learning how to "Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn." Romans 12:15

My teammate Silvia Alvares recently shared these words:

"Free, Sovereign, and Independent" reads our national coat of arms. As of September 15th of this year, we will be celebrating our separation from the Spanish colony 200 years ago! But is a nation engulfed in corruption, drug trafficking, violence, injustice, and impunity (among other things) really free and independent? Can a nation with an external public debt of nearly \$9 billion¹ be sovereign? The response is a resounding "No." Unfortunately, since Honduras

was proclaimed independent in 1821 until now, we continue drifting aimlessly. Honduras is a beautiful nation with a magnificent geographical position, landscapes that transport us to paradise, kind and hard-working people, people who know how to dream; yet we continue seeing their hopes dashed.

I am a Honduran who loves this land. I feel proud of our cuisine, our ancestors, our music, and so many other things; but I am also a Honduran deeply outraged by the fact that this precious land that God has given me is categorized as a dictatorship and a narco-state. So when will we have that long-awaited independence? Personally, I believe this will only happen when we have leaders who understand that power is for serving and not for being served; when we have educated children and youth, not only with theoretical knowledge but also critical thinking abilities and emotional intelligence. As followers of Jesus, we offer a spark of hope, not only to teach about the servant leadership that we so badly need in our country but also to give kids and youth a family, education, life skills, values, and a reason to see God's grace even among difficulties. May we continue planting opportunities and hope in the hearts of our children and youth.

Reflect:

These words are heavy, yet there is a spark of hope. Lucky for us, fires often need only a spark. These words provide a humbling perspective for our own politically turbulent times in the USA—and in weary anticipation of presidential elections in Honduras this year, they provide context from which we can grow in empathy and be present in both prayer and action with our Honduran brothers and sisters.



Pray:

Lord, you are my King and for that I am thankful. Awaken me from my sleep, so that I can see others. May your love consume and heal us, as you set fire to every spark of hope within us. Amen







He is always working in our lives

The widow who is really in need and left all alone puts her hope in God and continues night and day to pray and to ask God for help. -1 Timothy 5:5 NIV

Imagine the stress and uncertainty of knowing something is wrong when it is time to deliver your baby. Iradom, a young first-time mother, didn't "feel right" shortly after she went into labor. It had already been a stressful few months; shortly after she became pregnant, her husband was attacked by a band of thieves and never returned home, leaving Iradom a pregnant widow.

But God blessed Iradom with a loving and caring mother. When she went into labor, her mother helped her travel 25km to Good Shepherd Hospital to give birth. By the time they arrived, the baby was in distress. Iradom immediately underwent an emergency cesarean section to deliver the baby. The operation saved both their lives.

Although Iradom was not able to pay for the care, because of First Presbyterian Church's faithfulness to our shared MBF medical mission ministry, the resources were there to care for her and her child.



Reflect

When have things in your life not "felt right"? Looking back, how are you able to see that God was working in the midst of it?

Pray:

Loving and gracious Father, help me to remember that even when things don't feel right in my life, you are at work. Your timing is better than my timing, and when I come to you praying unceasingly, I will find comfort and peace.

Neither Chimwemwe nor Victor Shumba was encouraged or supported to get an education as a child. Consequently, they both dropped out of school. Together they have worked hard and now run their own small grocery shop where they live in the village of Chindoka. The shop generates enough business for them to get by ... barely. While the income helps pay for a small home and food (sometimes food that no one will buy at the store), an unexpected crisis would wipe out all they have.

So when Chimwemwe became pregnant, the plan was for her to deliver by midwife at home. But after being in labor for a while and the baby was still not delivered, Chimwemwe and Victor had no choice but to go to the hospital. She was admitted and delivered a healthy baby girl by cesarean section.

Victor worried about the cost of the hospital stay, operation, and medication. But when he found out there was no bill, he said he felt as though he was king for a day. First Presbyterian Church made this blessing possible.

The Shumbas have persevered and leaned on God for their strength. What do you need to persevere through in order to receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised?

Father, I pray that I will consider it pure joy wherever I face trials and have to persevere, because it is during these times my faith will grow. Help my unbelief so that others will see You reflected in me. Amen.

There is nothing like the joy and excitement of a new baby. The promise of new life! Nadine's pregnancy went perfectly. She received prenatal care and delivered successfully by a nurse/midwife at Darbonne Maternal and Child Health Clinic outside of Léogâne, Haiti.

Her beautiful daughter, Caïcha, entered into the world a healthy baby. When she was almost a year old, however, she began losing weight and having trouble keeping milk and formula down. Nadine and her husband's lives were turned upside down when the doctors said they had to admit baby Caïcha to Hôpital Ste. Croix (HSC).

Caïcha was diagnosed with an infection and the doctors said she needed to stay in the hospital for several days. Her parents are both unemployed and had no money to pay for her hospitalization and treatment, so they were prepared to take their child home. But because of First Presbyterian Church, your love for children, and your generosity, Caïcha's treatment was paid for in full.

God Loves New Jersey

"When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." - Matthew 9:36-38

God loves New Jersey. By His grace, InterVarsity Christian Fellowship has planted 6 campus fellowships across New Jersey in the last 7 years. He longs for students to know Him, and He is making Himself known, even in the pandemic.

One of these new campus fellowships is Rutgers Camden. In the early days of COVID, during the transition to online ministry, we sent out hundreds of invitations to Rutgers Camden students on social media, inviting them to join the fellowship. Student leaders and Nadeen, a campus missionary, noticed that about ten of the new students who were coming regularly were nursing students.

This was an answer to prayer! For a year, an IV staff and a nursing student named Tamara (pictured) had been praying for God to move powerfully the nursing department at Rutgers. They longed for these students to come and know Jesus!

After months of praying, we had enough nursing students to launch a missional healthcare small group! Tamara is learning to lead from Nadeen, and she will take over soon!

The group meets weekly to discuss and dissect Bible stories about Jesus as healer. In turn, they reflect on how that might impact a career in medicine. SNEHA Doon Academy exists thanks to the inspiration and dedication of Dr. Reeta and Hari Rao, who left their medical careers to help deprived communities in Dehradun. By 1995 they had a plot of land and soon after SNEHA was born. It has seen thousands of students move from class one to class twelve and has provided them with opportunities that they otherwise would not have had. Women and children in the slum community now have opportunities. Reeta was an ophthalmologist and was working as a medical director in a mission hospital in the Himalayas for ten years but she and her husband were called to work in a place that they were really needed. They took a leap and moved having no income. They could see that God was living in these homes and huts in the slums. They committed all of their savings.

They thought the need was medical, but they quickly realized that unless the children becoming educated they will not get out of the cycle of poverty. They found the children savaging and not going to school. They took up some land and built a school. They involved the entire community in the ministry adding a sewing school and a henna program for the women in the community to teach them skills so that they could earn a living. This has given the women a great self image and has improved their standing in the community. The school has become an oasis for children who come from unbelievable poverty. SNEHA is clean. It is spacious and it is a safe place for the children. It has a science lab. It has latrines. SNEHA means love in Hindi. Through this love and the love of God, SNEHA is able to bring transformation to their community.

Because the literacy class taught her how to read bus signs, she can safely travel to a market in a larger community and get home again. Since she also learned how to count money, she is able to use the profits from her sewing machine business to purchase items not available in her village without fear of being cheated.



She started a store in her home to sell snacks, fruits, vegetables, eggs, and other provisions to people in her village. She created two businesses from one, is able to help provide for her family, while improving the lives of others in her village.

Aruna is teaching other women in her village how to read and how to sew. Aruna was blessed through someone like you with the gift of literacy, empowerment, hope, and a sewing machine. She is using the blessings she received to bless others!

Here is what I saw on Facebook the day following the event...

"What a great ministry event yesterday!!! God worked for sure. Thanks to Dennis Rainey (and others at Family Life) for developing Stepping Up. (We) served **300 men** in small groups and at the ranch. Special thanks to (west coast) Tim for coming in to share his amazing story with the guys. These events are powerful and will touch generations."

Who Shall I Send?

Then I heard the Lord asking, "Whom should I send as a messenger to this people? Who will go for us?" I said, "Here I am. Send me." Isaiah 6:8 NLT

I have been working in Katerini, Greece, helping refugees who are arriving by translating and assisting with their paperwork. Greece is typically just a layover until they can move on to other parts of Europe. Greece's economy does not allow refugees to stay and find employment to support their families. When they arrive, they are often sick.

Last Sunday evening, my phone beeped. I ran to retrieve a message from Zahia. "We have arrived safely. We are at the refugee reception center. One suitcase did not make it, but I trust it will come later."

I replied, "Thank God, you are there as you had hoped to be." I told my friend, "Go to sleep now. You need your rest." Zahia and her family had been traveling for three days. I hardly slept for two nights. I needed to sleep too.

Zahia arrived at the Greek border three years ago. She was fleeing from her abusive husband. A single mother with two children, Zahia is well educated and was a lawyer in Syria. The Greek Evangelical Church chose to sponsor her and her children. With care and love, Zahia felt at home in Greece, soon learned Greek, attended church, accepted Jesus into her life, and joined the church's evangelistic events. She was able to participate in Arabic Christian Education classes to learn about Christianity in her own language. She became an interpreter with Perichoresis, where I met her for the first time.

I would often ask Zahia to help me hang curtains, make bread, or share a meal so that we could spend time together. It looked like Zahia was settling down in Greece. For many immigrants, Greece is just a stopping point on their journey. The economy and poverty in Greece do not afford enough opportunities to immigrants. When Zahia received her residence permit, she started preparing her family's travel documents. Once the quarantine was lifted and the border reopened, she decided to leave Greece to find a better home and greater opportunities for herself and her children. We prayed that God's will would be done for her. Zahia's family is only one of the many families stranded in Greece that wanted to leave, in search of a better home for themselves and their families.

Reflect: What is God sending you to do? Has he put people in your path Like Zahia who you have felt a friendship with? What journey will you make to serve our Lord?

Go Make Disciples

Matthew 28:19-20 (Amplified)

"Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations [help the people to learn of Me, believe in Me, and obey My words], baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teach them to observe everything that I have commanded you; and Io, I am with you always [remaining with you perpetually regardless of circumstance, and on the every occasion], even to the end of the age."

When I was a child of 5 years old, I had my school years book where I would paste a school photo on the page, write what I wanted to be when I grew up, and put any awards or report cards in the little pocket. At 5, I wrote that I wanted to be a missionary. From that day on, each year I would write the exact same thing. Once I graduated from high school, I headed to Moody Bible Institute as an International Missions major. The verses in Matthew written above were my daily prayer and echoed in my ears. To my shock and dismay, about one month into my time at Moody, God clearly called me to Urban ministry in the States. I was devastated, and wondered what I had done wrong. I had wanted to go to Uganda, to make disciples of all nations. In God's gentle way, He reminded me that all the nations of the world had been brought to our cities and communities in America. I needed to learn to love there first. Fast forward 25 years. I transitioned from UrbanPromise Camden staff, to UrbanPromise International staff. My very first trip was to, you guessed it, Uganda. I had worked with the UPI "fellows" for 6 years while working in Camden, and became very close to them. What I saw when I arrived at their ministries was humbling to say the least. The call to go and disciple was embraced by them, they had returned home to make disciples for the Lord. The impact they were making in their communities was impressive to say the least. I began to understand, they understood their culture, they understood the resources, needs, assets and potential in their communities. Within 2 years of their return from the states, microloans had changed over 100 women's lives and family situations, schools were growing and thriving, and children were being taught about Jesus. Going back home and realizing the special part God was allowing me to play in this work was humbling. But what really struck me was that God had given me the desire of my heart. It did not look like I wanted it to, or thought it would, but His plans were so much bigger and better. What an incredible gift to be part of His plans.



God continued to walk with me, both at college, in the inner-city, and brought me to UPI where I was blessed in playing a small part in what He is doing around the world. Do you have something that God has written on your heart, maybe yesterday or maybe 40 years ago?



Where SHALOM is Put to the Test

From the center of Mexico City, you can take the metro to the east on Line A. Get off at the last stop. Then take a bus to Los Reyes and get off at the last stop. Then take a micro bus up until the hills, and get off at the last stop. As you travel , the roads will go from paved to dirt to gravel to impassable. Your surroundings will fade from shiny, tall buildings to a rolling landscape of grey unfinished structures.

And then, if you're lucky and have the location right and if Google Maps didn't send you down an impassable route, you'll arrive at the Urban Mosaic Community Center in San Isidro. It's a lovely place... and simultaneously it's a place that is most definitely on the margins of the city; a place where SHALOM is being tested and simultaneously created and birthed. And, if you ask me, it's a place as sacred and as holy as any cathedral I've ever entered.

SHALOM is a rich word that doesn't translate well to English. It's rightness, wholeness, thriving, peace, good relationships. SHALOM is multidimensional: You can experience SHALOM with God, self, community and environment. Building SHALOM with community might look like a street paving project. Seeking SHALOM with family might mean teaching kids about their emotions. But what does SHALOM with GOD look like?

I arrive at the San Isidro Community Center- a place where SHALOM is being tested. As I park, my first thought is: "Do I have a flat tire?" So many bumpy, unpaved roads...I unload my gear and head inside to find a group of youth meeting for their Casa de Paz (Shalom Group).

While not all Casa de Paz groups focus specifically on youth, this one does; creating a space for youth to have fun and ask questions.

SHALOM FILLS THE AIR

While some of the youth come from pueblos (small rural towns) outside the city and others come from urban areas, these youth have a lot in common: their lives are hard...at home they are dealing with things like domestic violence, alcoholism, mental illness and parents who are unemployed. But hardship is not the only thing they share. They also share dreams... they dream of studying, of serving their community, of traveling and of living in a peaceful, safe place. They dream of SHALOM, but while they share dreams of SHALOM for tomorrow, they laugh, learn, reflect and togetherthrough the laughter, tears, camaraderie and prayers... SHA-LOM fills the air.

"Being a part of this Casa de Paz has helped me a lot," Norberto tells me. "Before this group, I didn't know many people who had big dreams and ideas... here we share a desire to learn more. I feel like I am a part of something, like I belong. Casa de Paz has helped me see diverse points of view and learn new things. This Casa de Paz isn't just a part of working with Urban Mosaic, it's creating better relationships with God, friends and also my community."

We walk with them as they get to know Jesus. We invite them into leading others to Living Water. "For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3).
